NAAC- Executive Summary

Criterion I: Curricular Aspects

Established in 1964, Periyar Arts College, Cuddalore is a postgraduate college run by the Government of Tamil Nadu. Its mission is to train young men and women to become good citizens of the country, develop global competencies and the skills necessary for being successful in life. The college offers fourteen undergraduate programmes and ten postgraduate programmes. The college is committed to providing an environment fostering research. A language lab at a cost of about six lakhs has been set up. The college has NSS, YRC, and RRB. Project work, field trips and on-the-job training are compulsory components of various programmes. The college also invites experts from various fields as faculty. Facilities for providing computer skills exist in the college. Environmental Studies & Human rights is mandatory for all the students of UG Semester I and PG Semester I respectively. To help the slow and disadvantaged learners, the college arranges remedial classes. There is a feed-back mechanism.

Criterion II: Teaching-Learning and Evaluation:

The college has an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) that meets periodically to discuss the various issues regarding teaching-learning and evaluation. The process of admitting students to various programme is

transparent. Students are admitted on the basis of merit. Single window system is followed. However, the college follows the guidelines laid down by the Government of Tamil Nadu in matter of reservation. It is a co-educational institution, and in some disciplines the number of girls exceeds that of boys. For differently-abled students also, there is a reservation policy. Student scholarship is given to SC,ST,BC and MBC communities.

For a well-rounded development of students, the college offers a proper blend of academics and sports. Before the commencement of various programmes, there is an orientation programme by the Principal in which the students are made aware of the traditions and objectives of the college. The college is sensitive to the need of disadvantaged students for whom remedial classes, counseling and special classes during vacations are organized.

The academic progress of a student is carefully and continuously monitored. Great emphasis is laid on assignments and continuous internal evaluation. The college lays great stress on attendance. The college prepares both monthly and annual academic calendars. The teaching-learning method is increasingly becoming student-centred. In most of the departments, free internet access is provided to students so that they can use it for self-study. Each department has a well-stocked library from which students borrow books regularly.

The college has a total of 86 faculty members. There are fifty Ph.D. and 36 M. Phil faculty members.. Thirteen teachers are currently registered for their Ph.D. Approximately 42% of the faculty members have participated in workshops/ seminars/ conferences and 17% of the teaching staff have presented their papers. There is also a self-appraisal system for teachers in place.

The schedule for examinations is published by the Thiruvalluvar University well in advance. At least 50% of the total number of examiners has to be from outside the college. The examination papers are coded. The Thiruvalluvar University gives exemplary punishment to students indulging in any unfair means during an examination. He or she is debarred from appearing in all the examinations for one year, besides being given a zero in all the papers of that examination in which he or she was caught adopting unfair means. The results of the End-Semester Examination are declared within thirty days after the examination is over.

Criterion III: Research, Consultancy and Extension:

A few members of the faculty have been Ph. D. supervisors. 3 major and eight minor research projects of the UGC and TNSCHe have been received by the faculty of the college. At the beginning of each year Rs. 15000/- are allotted to each department for conducting seminars, conferences and workshops. More than this amount can be used by the departments if funds permit. In the last five years, three national seminars, one state-level seminar and eighteen workshop/one day seminars have been conducted.

In order to encourage research, during the last five years the college has spent Rs. 1,15,00,000/= on the purchase of books, equipment and other infrastructural facilities. 18 research journals are available in the college library for the use of students and researchers. The college also subscribes to e-journals. The faculty members of all the science departments have access to the infrastructure available at the centre. Two large conference rooms are there in the college to organize national and international seminars/conferences. The conference halls are equipped with multimedia projectors and other facilities for conducting events. Wi-Fi connectivity is available for students and teachers in

the campus. After the previous accreditation a sum of Rs. thirty lakhs has been received for conducting basic science research and various other research activities (including major & minor research projects).

In the last five years, twenty-four faculty members have published a total of thirty-two research papers and articles taken together. The faculty members have also published eleven books during this period. Outreach programmes are regularly organized by the college. Students of the NSS have organized tree-plantation programmes, blood donation camps, AIDS awareness programmes, street plays to highlight social evils and many other programmes of social relevance. The college promotes institution-neighbourhood network through NSS, YRC & RRB. For their on-the-job training, students of this college have visited various organizations through placement cell.

Criterion IV: Infrastructure and Learning Resources:

The college is sufficiently well-endowed in terms of physical infrastructure. The college campus occupies an area of 52 acres. At present the college has 82 classrooms out of which 22 classrooms are large in size; each can easily accommodate more than 50 students. 11 classrooms are of moderate size and can accommodate up to 120 students. 10 classrooms are of smaller size and can accommodate up to 20 students. In addition to classrooms, the college has 02 audio rooms, 16 laboratories, 03 computer labs and one gas plant for the labs. The college has a central library besides different department libraries. The bar coding of books in the library is currently in progress. The college also has a number of labs. The college has four administrative rooms. For important functions such as convocations and annual day functions that require more covered space, special stages are made and pandals are set up in the college premises. There are other facilities such as cool and clean drinking water (RO)

and wash rooms for students and the faculty. The college has a placement and counseling centre too.

The college plans to provide transport facility in future in a phased manner. So far as the power supply is concerned, the college has one govt. high-tension transformers, four large generators for power backup. The college has a canteen, a room for the visiting doctor and three hostels (one under construction). For all academic activities, the college has the following facilities: multi-media projectors in classrooms, OHP, microphone facility in large rooms whenever needed.

For encouraging the students to take part in sports, the college has a football ground (under construction) and one volley ball court. The college also has no full-time qualified Physical Education Director. But one of the staff member Prof.I.Vannamuthu from Chemistry department is acting as Physical Education Director.

Criterion V: Student support and progression:

As mentioned earlier, the college has a well-equipped campus located in the west of silver beach. Our results show that on an average 85% of our students are successful in the examinations. Students of Periyar arts college, Cuddalore were rank holders in some of the subjects in Thiruvalluvar University examinations.

The college has a website which provides necessary details to the students. It is proposed that Applicants to various courses in the college can download application forms from the site send their applications online.

In keeping with the vision of the college, the college always provides special assistance to students of slow learners and girls in the form of remedial classes and counselling. In fact, counselling students department wise is a regular activity in this college.

Criterion VI: Governance and Leadership:

The Principal, the HODs of Arts, Science and Commerce provide effective leadership enabling the college to fulfill its twin missions of excellence in education and empowerment of the weaker sections of society. Besides the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) there are a number of committees to perform the various functions related to the college. The college also has a staff council with the Principal as its official President. Three senior members of the faculty represent the staff on the Admission procedures of the college. The college has an alumni association and Parent Teachers Association.

Criterion VII: Innovative Practices:

Over the years, the college has adopted a number of innovative practices the particulars of which are given in the detailed report. The popularity of the college is indicated by the number of applicants for different courses that is going up every year.

In the various functions of the college, the core values of NAAC are reflected. For realizing the vision of making quality assurance an integral part of the functioning of an institution of higher education, the college subjects itself to periodic self and external evaluation. All the five core values of NAAC, that is, national development, fostering global competencies among students,

inculcating a healthy value system, promoting the use of technology and quest for excellence are sought to be promoted by the various functions of the college.

In the light of the recommendations of the Peer Team which visited the college in 2005 the following steps have been taken:

Periyar Arts College has undergone the accreditation process by NAAC in 2005 and accredited C++. The NAAC peer team is suggested some facts in its report. Based on the critical evaluation the following Post-accreditation initiatives are taken and are as follows.

College Bursar is appointed by the Government of Tamil Nadu. Government is not recruited Physical Education Director. Unfortunately the NCC unit is abolished due to unavailability of NCC officer.

The teachers self appraisal and students feedback are collected and analysed.

College Library is computerized and having 5 computers with internet facility for the use of staff and students. All the book entries are incorporated in these computers. So student can do book access. INFLIBNET is under process. e- journals and periodicals are introduced in the library, Computer training is given to the staff members both teaching and non-teaching through NIIT. All the departments are having computers with internet for administrative and academic purpose.

Alumni association is established and registered. Contribution of alumni's are much appreciated. Alumni meeting are convened by the staff secretary.

Parent teachers association is functioning effectively. Some of the alumni are members in the PTA. It is one of the added advantages that strengthen the college by the relationship of alumni and PTA. PTA meeting is also convened in every academic year especially during admission and middle of the year. It is essential that parents are known about progressiveness in the study of their son/daughter and improve their quality of education.

Thiruvalluvar university is updated the curriculum in English by the way of Introduction of soft skill in the I year Undergraduate courses. It is very helpful for the students to develop spoken English to level best.

As per Peer Team suggestion, New PG courses are introduced in the past four years such as M.A., Tamil, English, History, Economics, M.Sc., Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology and Computer Science and UG courses in Microbiology and Political Science.

Sponsors from the outside source are given incentives to encourage the talented sports persons. Remarkably in boxing competition, Physics student Aravindavel (I-M.Sc.) is selected for Asian level.

All the departments are equipped with LCD projector and OHP. Recently 7 departments are procured smart boards, This facility is enhancing the quality of teaching and learning.

Internal quality assurance cell(IQAC) is established in the college during the year 2009 without any financial support. All the documentation work is carried over by the Principal's office. IQAC is now applied for financial from

the UGC. As per the UGC guideline IQAC committee members are nominated by the Principal.

Three Cycles shed and one car shed is constructed for parking the two wheelers and car. Canteen facilities are now available in the college campus. The college compound is constructed. In commemoration of 50th year of the college, a decorative name board is constructed in the front elevation of the college. College site map is also displayed at the entrance of the college indicating the location of various buildings inside the college campus. Girls hostel is under construction with the financial assistance from the UGC and work is in progress.

The top management is extended gratefulness to the NAAC peer team's suggestion. Based on the suggestions, the overall academic ambiance in the college is much better today than it was five years ago.

1. PROFILE OF THE PERIYAR ARTS COLLEGE

Periyar Arts College, Cuddalore with its rural background is situated on the shore of Bay of Bengal at Devanampattinam village, 200Km south of Chennai on the East Coast Road. The college has been named after Thanthai Peiyar E.V. Ramasamy, the great rationalist and social reformer.

COLLEGE CREST

Our college crest, in the form of a shield symbolizes our well-cherished aspiration of achieving perfect knowledge in every sphere of life. It also represents the spirit and the objectives of our college.

‘The Tower’, which forms the pinnacle of the crest not only suggests the lofty ideals such as high spirit, self confidence and courage which the students of the institution can attain, but also serves as a symbolic representation of the Government of Tamil Nadu.

‘The Elephants’, which guard the Tower of Sanctity on both sides, signify the manly qualities of boldness and frankness and also denote that our college is affiliated to the University of Madras. (Now Thiruvalluvar University, Vellore)

‘The Lighted Indian Lamp’, (Kuthuvilakku) in the middle of the crest stands for mental or spiritual illumination or enlightenment. The lamp of learning sheds its lustre upon the dark corners of the mind. The darkness of ignorance, the clouds of illiteracy, the falsehood that masquerades as truth, the dim and vague shapes of prejudice and bigotry are all dispelled in its bright light. Knowledge is represented by an open book in front of the Divine Lamp. It is the duty of a college to impart solid knowledge to the students.

‘The ship on its voyage’ which is at the bottom of the crest, symbolises the Character of endlessness is the pursuit of knowledge. The Ocean is the

image of eternity. To discern the eternal truth in everything is wisdom. Besides, a ship on the sea represents Cuddalore, which is a coastal town.

Very appropriately our College crest is underlined with a profound aphorism, taken from the Sacred Kural “Kedil Vizhuchelvam Kalvi -” Learning is the precious undecaying wealth of a man.

HISTORY AND BACKGROUND OF THE COLLEGE

Thanks to the sincere efforts of the South Arcot Development Council, Periyar Arts College was started in 1964 at Cuddalore. Initially 360 students

were admitted in four different branches in the Pre – University course and the college functioned in the District Board Buildings. In 1965, the college was upgraded to First Grade College. On 06-09-1964, the Hon’ble Chief Minister of Madras, Thiru. M.Bakthavatsamam, inaugurated the college. It attained 12B and 2f status of the UGC in the year 1966. From 1966 onwards the college has obtained all sorts of financial assistance from the UGC. In every plan period, UGC has allotted funds to the college for the improvement of academic infrastructures. Recently under the UGC XII plan, the college received Rs.50 Lakhs.

In 1965, Mathematics, English Literature and Economics were offered at the undergraduate level. Further, three more pre-university branches were introduced.

The total area of the college is 52 acres, which was magnanimously donated by the Government of Tamil Nadu. On 04-04-1964, the foundation stone for the permanent building was laid by the then Chief Minister Hon’ble Thiru. M.Bakthavatsalam. From June 1970, the college has been functioning in its own premises. The B.Com., course was started in 1973. The B.Sc., degree course in Chemistry and Physics were started in 1979. The B.Sc., degree course in Botany and B.A., degree course in History were started in 1980. The B.Sc., degree course in Zoology was started in 1983. The college was upgraded to Post-Graduate College in 1986, with introduction of the M.Com. degree course. In 1996 M.Sc., Mathematics was started. M.Phil and Ph.D in Research degrees Commerce was introduced in the year 2012. Post graduate courses in the field of science has been recently started with M.Sc. Botany in the year 2011-12 M.A. degree in English Literature and Undergraduate degree in Statistics. In the subsequent academic year M.Sc.,Physics, M.Sc.,Computer Science, M.Sc.,Zoology was started in the science stream and M.A.,History, M.A.,Economics in the Arts stream. In the present academic year, 2013-2014,

M.Phil and Ph.D in Tamil, B.Sc.,Microbiology and B.A.,Political Science have been started. Botany, Mathematics, Commerce and Tamil departments were upgraded to research departments. Other Post graduate departments are seeking upgradation to that of research departments in the forth coming academic year 2014-2015.

In 1996-97, the B.Sc., degree course in Industrial Chemistry under Vocational Stream was started with the financial assistance from the U.G.C under the scheme of vocationalisation at the first-degree level. In the same year B.Sc., Computer Science was also started. B.A., Economics were started.

Academic reputation and Provision

The students evince keen interest in theoretical studies and in their practical classes. The tables containing percentage of passes in different subjects have been enclosed herewith. Regarding the cultural attainments, the students take active part in debates, seminars, literary competitions, social service activities, Radio programmes, National Service Scheme, Sports, Red cross Society and all other cultural programmes. They have won prizes, Medals, Shields, Rolling Cups etc., in all the fields.

Academic Attainments of the Staff

There are many M.Phil degree holders and doctorates among the staff. Some have produced papers in scientific journals and taken part in symposia. Almost 75% of the staff have undergone the Training Programmes conducted by Academic Staff College and participated in various Orientation Courses and Summer Institutes in their fields. The list of the members of the staff with their qualifications and experience along with the personal profile is enclosed.

The Mode of Selection of Students and Teachers

The students are selected based on their performance in the qualifying examinations. The rules and regulations laid down by the Government of Tamil Nadu are being followed in the process of selection of the students. The reservation for different categories is followed in accordance with the norms set by the government. Regarding the selection of teachers, the Teacher Recruitment Board is the Appointing Authority. In the event of delay in the posting by teacher Recruitment Board, the Principal is empowered to appoint part time teachers in the existing vacancies.

Physical facilities i.e., Library, Accommodation and Equipment

The College Library is housed in a separate block very well equipped, with nearly 40000 books for the use of the students and the staff. Each department has a library of its own. The library was upgraded to digital library by the Government of Tamil Nadu in the academic year 2012-2013

The institution is presently enjoying spacious and adequate accommodation both for the students as well as the staff. The physical accommodation is complemented with necessary equipments, like computers with multimedia extension. The adequacy of accommodation and the vacant land available at the disposal of the college are such that a few more courses can also be started. The details of the physical facilities in various departments herewith enclosed.

Institutional Management

Periyar Arts College, Cuddalore is one of the oldest Government constituent colleges under the control, supervision and management of the Director of the Collegiate Education, Government of Tamil Nadu. It is needless

to state that as a Government college, it has not suffered from either lack of finance or support from the University. As and when new courses are started, the affiliation and other related approvals are granted to this college as a matter of course. The college, being situated in an educationally and economically backward region, is enjoying the patronage and special privileges from the Government. The permission granted to this college to start B.Sc., (Industrial Chemistry) is a case in point. Alongwith the Director of Collegiate Education and Regional Joint Director at Tiruchi, the college has a council to assist and aid the Principal, in the matters of administration and in maintain discipline. The college council comprises all the heads of Departments the Librarian and the Physical Director.

The Financial Resources for the Development of the institution

As stated above, the financial flow for the development of the institution has been steady over the years as the Government is keen to develop this institution as a premier seat of higher learning. It was with this end in view that the Government readily accorded permission to start B.Sc., Computer Science and B.Sc., Industrial Chemistry under U.G Vocationalisation scheme. That the University Grants commission readily permitted the same is a testimony to the financial prospects of the institution.

The extent of freedom enjoyed by the staff for advanced Scholarship Research and Experimentation etc.

The staff enjoy necessary freedom to explore and avail themselves of all avenues for their academic attainments and professional advancement. The UGC sponsorship under FIP is fully availed of and in some cases the staffs have enhanced their qualifications by undergoing sequential programmes. It is pertinent to point out that the college has forwarded ambitious proposals for the

conduct of UGC sponsored seminars and symposia (List enclosed). In this academic year, various departments got research projects from different funding agencies including student mini projects at post graduate level from the Tamil State council for Higher Education (List enclosed).

Our college entered into the 50th year of academic services. The college has proposed to celebrate its Golden Jubilee with all memorable events. In commemoration of the celebration, the college has conducted various events such as science exhibition, inter-departmental competitions, fine arts events, seminar and workshops. For the first time, in the history of our college, the Maths department has conducted an International workshop inviting professor from kaohsiung (Taiwan) University. The college is further endowed with four post- doctoral faculties. The Guest faculties appointed on temporary basis too possess the required qualification as per UGC regulations.

The goal of formative assessment is to *monitor student learning*, to provide ongoing feedback that can be used by the staff to improve their teaching and by students to improve their learning. More specifically, formative assessments:

- students identify their strengths by the staff and weaknesses and target areas that need work
- The staff recognize areas where students are struggling and address the problems immediately

Formative assessments are generally *low stakes*, which means that they have low or no point value. Examples of formative assessments include asking students to do:

a concept map was given in class to represent their understanding of a topic

- early feedback given by the students on teaching is reviewed

Summative assessment

The goal of summative assessment is to *evaluate student learning* at the end of an instructional unit by comparing it against some standard or benchmark. The Staff is assessed can by entire class of students, but assessment in done individually to see how each has performed.

Summative assessments are often *high stakes*, which means that they have a high point value. Examples of summative assessments include:

- a midterm exam
- a final practical test
- a course paper review
- a overall recital

If a student feels that the marks awarded are not up to his/her expectation he/she may apply for scrutiny in that paper with prescribed fee within 15 days of the declaration of results. Scrutiny implies retotaling and checking of the evaluated papers.

Mostly all other graduates got placement in the private sector such as mobile agencies, private banks, marketing and sales etc

Government Scholarships are provided up to the tune of Rs.8,62,575=00 to all community wise eligible students.

COMPUTER LITERACY PROGRAMME

A Computer Literacy Programme was initiated by the Government of Tamil Nadu in all Government Colleges to enrich all Undergraduate Non-Computer Science students from the year 2000-2001. This course was exclusively designed and geared with updated systems orienting towards providing the required knowledge to the students and for their upliftments in computer literacy. This course has been conducted for students from all disciplines expecting computer science.

Initially, a separate lab was established with 25 computers and other necessary equipments and a certificate course was being conducted in collaboration with NIIT Cuddalore, under a contract period of 5 years.

In the year 2005-2006, the CLP lab with all equipments was handed over to the college by NIIT and thereafter course had been conducted successfully for all the first year under graduate students. This one year course is being offered for Rs.700/- with 90 practical hours and 60 theory hours. An examination is conducted by the Directorate of Collegiate Education, Chennai at the end of the course and a valid certificate is issued.

Right now, there are around 930 students from 13 departments on roll and classes are held from 9.00 a.m. to 5.00 p.m. on all college working days. The department of Computer Science is monitoring and managing the conduct of the programme and Mr.P.MOUROUGARADJANE., M.C.A., M.Phil., M.Tech., Assistant Professor of Computer Science, is acting as Course Coordinator for CLP.

- The Computer Literacy Programme is being conducted for Non-Computer science students.
- The students are being trained on the state- of-art technologies both theoretically and practically.
- The orientation of the training is towards job fetching in the IT market with renowned skills in recent developments.

Course Curriculum

The students are trained on the basic knowledge of MS-Office, Internet technologies, basic of C language and HTML. A common examination (theory) is conducted for the CLP students throughout Tamil Nadu, at the end of the course. Based on their performance, a Certificate is issued from the Government of Tamil Nadu which is of great potential to them during their placement oppoutunities.

Computer training is given to the staff members both teaching and non-teaching through NIIT. All the departments are having computers with internet for administrative and academic purpose.

Alumni association is established and registered. Contribution of alumni's are much appreciated. Alumni meeting are convened by the staff secretary.

Parent teachers association is functioning effectively. Some of the alumni are members in the PTA. It is one of the added advantages that strengthen the college by the relationship of alumni and PTA. PTA meeting is also convened in every academic year especially during admission and middle of the year. It is essential that parents are known about progressiveness in the study of their son/daughter and improve their quality of education.

Thiruvalluvar university is updated the curriculum in English. Introduction of soft skill and communication skill in English is introduced in I year and II year Undergraduate courses. It is very helpful for the students to develop spoken English to level best.
